

## Lingual Frenotomy (Tongue Tie Repair)

## After Care Instructions:

- It is important to understand that depending on the type of tongue-tie your baby had, improvement with breastfeeding may not be immediate. It can take a little time for your baby to learn how to use his/her tongue effectively.
- You may breastfeed or bottle feed your baby immediately following.
- Your baby may use a pacifier immediately following surgery.
- Pain Relief: Most babies experience only minimal discomfort after the procedure, and breastfeeding provides natural pain relief. If, however, your baby seems uncomfortable, Tylenol can be given to help with discomfort.

\*\*NOTE: Dosage schedule may be obtained from the pharmacist or pediatrician and is always based on your baby's weight. Motrin should not be used until after six months of age

- Stretching Exercises:
  - o Your baby's mouth heals quickly, and stretching exercises are very important after the procedure to make sure that the area that was released does not heal back together.
  - o Before starting the exercises, make sure that your hands are clean, and your fingernails are short.
  - o These stretches are NOT meant to be forceful or prolonged.
  - o It's best to be quick and precise with your movements.
  - o I feel that getting an affordable LED headlight (like a camping headlight) allows you to get the best results.
  - o The following exercises should be started the evening of the day of surgery.
  - o Stretches should be resumed the next morning. THIS IS THE ONLY NIGHT YOU WILL NOT DO STRETCHES DURING THE NIGHT. It is necessary to do at least one stretch during the night for the next 10 days to prevent reattachment.
  - o Tongue-Tie Exercise: Lift the tongue as high as it will go. Press gently on the surgical site, running the finger horizontally and vertically for 3 seconds. Repeat every 5-6 hours for 14 days. Gentle massage should be continued for an additional 14 days 2-3 times/day once stretches are completed to break up any remaining scar tissue.
- Common post-operative healing consequences:
  - o Low grade fever, under 100 degrees F
  - o Slight bleeding of the surgical area for one to two days
